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THE MONTH OF ELUL

Elul is the final month of the Jewish year. It is a month that connects the past year with the coming year—a time when we reflect on where we stand and where we should be going, a time that has been designated as a time of mercy and forgiveness, and an opportune time for teshuvah—returning to G-d.

During this month we have our Mezuzot and Tefillin checked, study more Torah, give more charity, pray with more feeling, and make good resolutions for the coming year. After prayers each morning (except Shabbat), it is customary to blow the Shofar.

ELUL 18

Birthday of Rabbi Yisrael Baal Shem Tov (1698–1760), founder of Chassidism, renowned for his love of every Jew. Birthday of Rabbi Shneur Zalman of Liadi (1745–1812), known as the Alter Rebbe, founder of the Chabad-Lubavitch intellectual branch of Chassidism, author of Tanya and Shulchan Aruch HaRav.

ELUL 26

First day, this year, for saying Selichot, "prayers for forgiveness." The first Selichot are said early Sunday morning after midnight (about 1:00 a.m. when Daylight Savings Time is in effect). The other Selichot are said before dawn or in the early morning until Rosh Hashanah.

THE SEFER TORAH

A Sefer Torah, or Torah Scroll, is a handwritten scroll with 304,805 letters, containing the Five Books of Moses. It is written by a scribe who is specially ordained to write, and its laws are meticulously detailed. The final commandment of the Torah is to write one's own Sefer Torah. Today this is commonly done through buying a letter, chapter or portion in a joint Sefer Torah.

Buying a letter in a joint Sefer Torah joins one together in unity with Jews throughout the world who have also obtained a letter in unity Torah scrolls. For more information, visit www.UnityLetter.com


TORAH STUDY

Torah is the medium of communication through which G-d enables man to know, serve and connect to Him. The campaign for Torah study encourages every individual to set fixed times for Torah study every day, so that our spiritual growth and development can be systematic and directed.

Since the giving of the Torah at Sinai, Torah study has been an integral part of Jewish life. Rabbi Shneur Zalman of Liadi explained that Torah study should be fixed not only in time but also in soul. It should be the vortex around which the entire spectrum of our day-to-day experience revolves.

The Talmud tells the story of when the Roman government issued a decree forbidding Torah study. Papus ben Yehudah saw Rabbi Akiva conducting Torah classes and asked him, "Do you not fear punishment by the law?" Rabbi Akiva answered with a parable:

A fox was strolling along the riverbank and noticed fish swimming swiftly from place to place. He asked, "Why are you running?" They replied, "We are afraid of the net that people set up to catch us." The fox slyly said, "Perhaps it would be wise to ascend to the shore and live together with me as my parents lived with your parents." The fish responded, "You speak foolishly; if we are afraid in our native habitat, our fear will be even greater on land, where death will be certain." Similarly, Torah is our source of life and may save us. Without it we will definitely perish (Berachot 61b).

TISHREI 1-2 | ROSH HASHANAH

Rosh Hashanah ("Head of the Year"), the Jewish New Year, is celebrated as a two-day holiday. On these days the Heavenly Court decides all that is to happen to all beings during the coming year.

It is customary on Rosh Hashanah to eat foods symbolizing sweetness, blessings and abundance. We dip the challah in honey; and afterwards, on the first night of the holiday, Oct. 2, we eat a piece of apple dipped in honey. After the appropriate blessing on the apple, we add: "May it be Your will to renew for us a good and sweet year."

The Shofar

On both days of Rosh Hashanah, Oct. 3 and 4, during the daytime, we hear at least the first thirty of the prescribed blasts of the Shofar (ram's horn).

Tashlich

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Thursday, Oct. 3, following the afternoon prayer, we visit a body of water or pond containing live fish and recite the Tashlich prayers.

TISHREI 3 | FAST OF GEDALIAH

Gedaliah was a righteous Jewish governor appointed by the Babylonian conquerors after they destroyed the First Temple. When he was assassinated (422 BCE), our people's plight hit an extreme low. This fast day commemorates this tragic event.

TISHREI 6

Yahrtzeit of Rebbetzin Chana Schneerson (1880– 1964), mother of the Lubavitcher Rebbe.

THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

On the day preceding Yom Kippur, Friday, Oct.

11, we eat festive meals, to demonstrate our faith and confidence in G-d's mercy. Another beautiful custom for this day is that of parents blessing their children. Yom Kippur atones for sins against G-d, but not for wrongdoings between man and man. It is therefore important, before Yom Kippur, to apologize and seek forgiveness from friends, relatives, and acquaintances, to heal any ill feelings which may have arisen.

TISHREI 10 | YOM KIPPUR

Yom Kippur ("Day of Atonement") is the holiest day in the Jewish year. In addition to the prohibition of work, as on the Sabbath, there are five activities specifically prohibited on Yom Kippur, from Friday evening, Oct. 11, until Saturday night, Oct. 12: eating and drinking, anointing oneself with perfumes or lotions, marital relations, washing or bathing (for pleasure) and wearing leather shoes.

TISHREI 15-21 | SUKKOT

Sukkot is a joyous holiday. For seven days, we are once again the original people of Moses wandering in the wilderness, surrounded by the Clouds of Glory. Only now those clouds are the greenery of a festive hut called a Sukkah. All meals are eaten in the Sukkah, barring inclement weather. All the common activities of life, when they happen inside the Sukkah, become holy acts. And all of the person is encompassed in this mitzvah, from head to toe.

THE FOUR SPECIES

Each day of Sukkot, from Thursday, Oct. 17, through Wednesday, Oct. 23, except fot Shabbat, we shake the Four Species during the daytime. Hold the lulav (palm branch), three hadassim (myrtle branches), and two aravot (willow branches) in the right hand, with the lulav's "spine" facing you. Say the



appropriate blessing(s), then take the etrog (citron) in the left hand with the point, or "pitom," up, bring it together with the other three kinds, and shake it.

TISHREI 21

The seventh day of Sukkot, Oct. 23 is called Hoshana Rabbah. It is customary to stay awake the preceeding night and recite portions of Torah and the Book of Psalms. In the morning, we circle the bimah (Torah reading platform) seven times, lulav and etrog in hand. Then we recite special prayers, called hoshanot, while holding five willow branches bound together. We beat the willow branches on the floor, symbolically sweetening G-d's judgment.

TISHREI 22-23

On the evening of Simchat Torah (Thursday, Oct. 24), and in some communities on the evening of Shemini Atzeret as well, we make seven hakafot (circlings) around the bimah, singing and dancing with the Torah scrolls. On the morning of Simchat Torah, Oct. 25, the final portion of the Torah is read, completing the yearly cycle. Then we immediately read the first portion, beginning the cycle anew. Thus, we continue to delve into the infinite wisdom of G-d's Torah—the eternal force that has bound us together and sustained us for more than 3,300 years.

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CHESHVAN 7

At the time of the Holy Temple, the economy of Israel was dependent on rainfall to make the crops grow. Nevertheless, out of their great love for one another, the Jews in Israel waited two full weeks after Sukkot, until Cheshvan 7, before requesting rain, rather than possibly inconvenience even the last few pilgrims on their return trip to the most distant boundary of the Holy Land.

CHESHVAN 11

Rachel, wife of Jacob, mother of Joseph and Benjamin, passed away (1563 BCE). She is buried outside Bethlehem.

CHESHVAN 20

Birthday of Rabbi Sholom DovBer (1860–1920), known as the Rebbe RaShaB, fifth leader of Chabad-Lubavitch.

PRAYER

NOVEMBER 2024

Tishrei-Cheshvan 5785

Jewish prayer, is G-d's way of saying, "Speak to Me and I will listen." Jews engage in prayer three times a day—morning, afternoon, and evening—to thank, praise, and petition G-d. These prayers can occur in synagogues, homes, airports, or offices, serving as moments for reflection and connection.


Components of Prayer:

Shema: A declaration of faith recited morning and evening. Amidah (Silent Prayer): The heart of each service, comprising 19 blessings.

Torah Reading: Integral during communal prayers. Psalms, Blessings, and Other Prayers: Additional elements to enrich the service.

The evolution of prayer:

Initially, prayer was a spontaneous act without fixed texts or times. Each individual expressed their needs and gratitude in their own words. After the First Temple's destruction and the Babylonian exile in 423 BCE, many Jews lost fluency in Hebrew. Ezra the Scribe and the Men of the Great Assembly



addressed this by creating a standard Hebrew prayer text and establishing three daily prayer times.

Structure of Modern Prayer:

By the 2nd century CE, the structure of Jewish prayer, as known today, was formalized. This includes the Amidah, the Shema, and other prayers and blessings. On Shabbat and Jewish holidays, an additional prayer is included after the morning service.

Personal Connection:

Beyond formal services, Jews are encouraged to engage in personal, heartfelt prayers, maintaining a constant, intimate dialogue with G-d. This blend of communal and personal prayer reflects the essence of Jewish worship, described by the sages as the "service of the heart."

Jewish prayer embodies a profound tradition of daily connection with G-d, rooted in history and evolving to meet the spiritual needs of each generation.

A new six-session course

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KEVER RACHEL

The tomb of Rachel, wife of Jacob, and mother of Joseph and Benjamin, is located outside Bethlehem. Unlike her sister Leah, who is buried in Hebron alongside Jacob, Rachel was buried on the roadside.

Jacob buried Rachel on the roadside as commanded by G-d. This was to provide comfort to her descendants during their exile after the First Temple's destruction in 423 BCE. As they marched in despair, they would pass her grave, take courage, and cry to her. Rachel would then beseech G-d on their behalf. This is vividly described by the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice is heard on high, wailing, bitterly crying. Rachel weeps for her children; she refuses to be consoled for they are gone." G-d responds; "Restrain your voice from weeping, hold back your eyes from their tears. For your work has its reward, and your children shall return to their border."

For centuries, Kever Rachel was a deserted roadside grave where her descendants came to pour out their hearts. Rachel remains a continuous source of comfort, praying for her children and eliciting the divine promise of their return to the Promised Land. Today it is a major site of prayer, especially on her yahrzeit, the 11th of Cheshvan.

HOW TO CELEBRATE CHANUKAH

Kindle the Chanukah menorah on each of the eight nights of Chanukah. For the dates and times, see the calendar below. For the lights of the menorah, use olive oil or candles large enough to burn until at least half an hour after nightfall. Use a "shamash" (service candle) to kindle the lights, and place it in its special place on the menorah.

Before kindling recite the blessings, and after kindling recite "Haneiros Hallalu." See the calendar below for which blessings to say.

All members of the family should be present at the kindling of the Chanukah lights. Have all young boys kindle their own Chanukah menorahs, and all young girls light their own Shabbat candles. Students and singles who live in a dormitory or in their own apartments should kindle menorahs in their own rooms. Chanukah lights are kindled in the front window or by a doorway.

For the number of lights and the order of kindling, see the calendar below. 1. Buh-rookh ah-tuh ah-dohnoi, eh-loh-hay-noo meh-lech huh-oh-luhm, ah-shehr kee-deh-shuh-noo beh-mitzvoh-suhv, veh-tzee-vuh-noo leh-hahd-leek nayr khahnoo-kuh.

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who has sanctified us with His commandments, and commanded us to kindle the Chanukah light.

2. Buh-rookh ah-tuh ah-dohnoi, eh-loh-hay-noo meh-lech huh-oh-luhm, sheh-uh-suh nee-sim lah-ah-voh-say-noo, bah-yuh-mim huh-haym bizmahn hah-zeh.

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who performed miracles for our forefathers in those days, at this time.

The following blessing is said only on the first evening (or the first time one kindles the lights this Chanukah):

 Buh-rookh ah-tuh ah-dohnoi, eh-loh-hay-noo meh-lech huh-oh-luhm, sheh-heh-khehyuh-noo, veh-kee-yeh-muhnoo, veh-kee-gee-uh-noo liz-mahn hah-zeh.

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who has granted us life, sustained us, and enabled us to reach this occasion.

KISLEV 14

Wedding anniversary of the Lubavitcher Rebbe and Rebbetzin (1928).

KISLEV 15

Antiochus IV Epiphanes (called Epimanes, "madman," by his subjects) had his soldiers desecrate the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. This sparked the revolt of the Maccabees, led by Matisyahu the Hasmonean and his five sons, which eventually gave us the holiday of Chanukah.

KISLEV 19

Rabbi DovBer of Mezeritch, known as the Maggid of Mezeritch, passed away (1772). He was the chief disciple and successor of the Baal Shem Tov.

Release from czarist imprisonment in Petersburg (1798) of his youngest disciple, Rabbi Shneur Zalman of Liozhna (later of Liadi), known as the Alter Rebbe, founder of Chabad-Lubavitch, author of Tanya, Shulchan Aruch HaRav and other profound works. Celebrated throughout the world as the "New Year of Chassidism."

KISLEV 25-TEVET 2 | CHANUKAH

"What is Chanukah?... When the Greeks entered the Sanctuary (in Jerusalem), they defiled all the oil (used for lighting the seven-branched



menorah) there. When the rulers of the Hasmonean family overcame them and triumphed, they searched and found only one flask of oil remaining with the seal of the Kohen Gadol (high priest). It had only enough oil to light for one day. A miracle occurred to it, and they used it to light for eight days. The following year, they (the Sages) established it as a permanent holiday of praise and thanksgiving" (Talmud, Shabbat 21b). This occurred in the year 165 BCE. Kislev 25 is also the anniversary (1313 BCE) of the completion of the temporary sanctuary (Mishkan) built by the Jewish People in the desert (Exodus 25–27, 30–31, 35–40). But it was not dedicated or erected for another three months. Instead, the day of Kislev 25 waited to become a holiday until the Hasmoneans rededicated the Temple from Greek defilement 1148 years later.

JANUARY 2025 עבת-שבט ה'תשפ"ה - Tevet-Shevat 5785 Passing of Ezra the Scribe (313 BCE). Ezra led the return of the Jewish people to the land of Israel after the Babylonian exile (423-353 BCE). He oversaw the rebuilding of the Second Temple, canonized the 24 books of the Tanach (holy scriptures), and led the Men of the Great Assembly, who instituted many laws and practices, including formalized praver.

TEVET 10

Anniversary of the start of the siege of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon (425 BCE), culminating in the destruction of the First Temple. Commemorated since then as a public fast day.

TEVET 20

RaMBaM (Maimonides), Rabbi

MOSHIACH-OUR REDEEMER

"I believe with complete faith in the coming of Moshiach. And though he may tarry, I shall wait, anticipating his arrival each day." (Number 12 of Maimonides' 13 Principles of Faith)

Moshiach will free the Jewish People from all servitude to foreign nations, rebuild the Holy Temple in Jerusalem and gather all the Jews of the entire world to Israel. Peace and prosperity will be universal, and all the nations of the world will serve the one G-d.

Moshe ben Maimon (1135–1204), passed away in Cairo, Egypt, and was buried in Tiberias, Israel. Outstanding codifier, commentator, philosopher, physician to Sultan Saladin, and leader of Egyptian Jewry, his brilliant works are studied to this day. It was said of him: "From Moses to Moses (i.e., the RaMBaM), there was none like Moses!"

The Lubavitcher Rebbe has urged all Jews to study daily his Mishneh Torah (authoritative code of Jewish law), or at least the briefer Sefer HaMitzvos.

TEVET 24

Rabbi Schneur Zalman of Liadi (1745–1812), first leader of Chabad-Lubavitch, author of Tanya and Shulchan Aruch HaRav, passed away.

THE SHABBAT

Shabbat (also known as "Shabbos" or the "Sabbath") is the centerpiece of Jewish life, and has been so since the infancy of our nation. According to the Talmud, Shabbat is equal to all the other commandments. Shabbat is so central to Jewish life that the term shomer Shabbat (Shabbat observer) is synonymous with "religious Jew" in common parlance.

Shabbat is a day of rest and celebration

The seven species of Israel are wheat, barley, grape (wine), fig, pomegranate, olive (oil), and date (honey). Many people have the custom of eating carob on this day, while others eat jam or preserves from the etrog left over from Sukkot.

SHABBAT SHIRAH

("Sabbath of Song"). So called because the weekly Torah portion contains the song that the Jewish People sang to celebrate their escape from the Egyptian armies who were miraculously drowned in the Red Sea (Exodus 15:1-19).


SHEVAT 22

> that begins on Friday at sunset and ends on the following evening after nightfall. Let's have a look at the history, importance and observances of this day.

Our sages tell us that the Shabbat is a "queen," whose regal presence graces every Jewish home for the duration of the Shabbat day. For this reason, we wash ourselves, dress in our finest clothes and make sure our homes are in tip-top shape on Friday afternoon. According to the Talmud, we

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actually receive a special additional soul every Shabbat.

The prophet Isaiah (58:13–14) foretells great delight that comes as a reward "if you restrain your foot because of the Sabbath, from performing your affairs on My holy day, and you call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the L-rd honored, and you honor it by not doing your customary ways, by not pursuing your affairs and speaking words. Then, you shall delight with the L-rd, and I will cause you to ride on the high places of the land, and I will give you to eat the heritage of Jacob your father, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

Shabbat is so special that even our choice of words, comportment, and the items that we touch must be consistent with this holy day. This includes the admonition not to handle items known as muktzeh, which have been set aside because they generally have no use within the Shabbat lifestyle.

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SHABBAT PARSHAT ZACHOR

When the Jewish nation left Egypt, no other nation dared to challenge them. Who would confront a people whose God had just devastated the powerful Egypt with ten extraordinary plagues and drowned remaining survivors in the sea? Only Amalek, driven by an irrational and profound hatred, dared to wage battle against them.

To commemorate this, we have a commandment to supplement the Torah reading on the Shabbat before Purim with the portion that begins with "Zachor" (Remember) and which bids us to remember what Amalek did.

ADAR 13 | FAST OF ESTHER

This date was chosen by Haman to annihilate all Jews in all 127 provinces of the Persian Empire, with the permission of King Achashverosh. Queen Esther thwarted his plan and received the king's permission for the Jews to resist. However, they were still in mortal danger, and therefore forbidden by Jewish law to fast (for the purpose of arousing Divine mercy) on that day, so as not to weaken themselves when they might have to fight for their lives. The only member of the Jewish People who was certainly safe was Queen Esther herself. Therefore only she fasted, which is why the fast is called by her name.

ADAR 14 | PURIM Purim commemorates the day when Jews throughout the Persian Empire were miraculously saved, and rested from fighting their enemies on the previous day, having totally routed them.

HOW TO CELEBRATE PURIM

Listen to the Megillah

To relive the miraculous events of Purim, we listen to the reading of the Megillah (the Scroll of Esther) on Thursday night, March 13, and again during the daytime of Friday, March 14. When Haman's name is mentioned, we twirl graggers and stamp our feet to "drown out" his evil name. Tell the children that Purim is the only time when it's a mitzvah to make noise!

Send Gifts of Food

On Purim we emphasize the importance of Jewish unity and friendship by sending gifts of food to friends. Send a gift of at least two kinds of ready-to-eat foods (for example, pastry, fruit, beverage) to at least one friend on March 14, during the daytime. It is proper that men send to men, and women to women. Sending these gifts should be done through a third party. Children, in addition to sending their own gifts of food, make enthusiastic messengers.

Give Gifts to the Needy

Concern for the needy is a year-round responsibility for the Jew. On Purim, particularly, it is a special mitzvah to remember the poor. Give charity to at least two—but preferably more—needy individuals on March 14, during the daytime. The mitzvah is best fulfilled by giving directly to the needy. If, however, you cannot find poor people, place at least several coins into pushkas (charity boxes). Even small children should fulfill this mitzvah.

Eat the Festive Meal

As on all festivals, we celebrate Purim with a special festive meal on March 14, during the daytime, when family and friends gather together to rejoice in the Purim spirit.

Machatzit Hashekel

When the Holy Temple stood in Jerusalem, each Jew contributed a half-shekel annually, thereby having a share in the sacrifices offered on behalf of the entire Jewish People. Today we commemorate this by giving 3 "half" coins (e.g., 3 half-dollars) to charity. This mitzvah should be done on March 13 or 14.

ADAR 15

Shushan Purim commemorates the day when the Jews of Shushan, capital of Persia, rested from fighting their enemies, after the king granted them an extra day to finish off the job. It, instead of the previous day, is observed as Purim in all cities surrounded by a wall since the time of Joshua, such as Jerusalem. Elsewhere it is celebrated as a minor holiday. This year, as it falls out on Shabbat, its observed in Jerusalem over three days.

HOW TO PREPARE FOR PASSOVER

Note: This year Passover starts on Saturday night. Therefore, to maintain the sanctity of the Shabbat, certain things are done on the Thursday night or Friday before Passover which would usually be done on the eve of Passover.

What is Chometz?

Chometz is any food or drink made from wheat, barley, rye, oats or spelt, or their derivatives, which is forbidden on Passover because it is leavened or fermented. If a food contains any of these ingredients and is not certified as "kosher for Passover," it's considered chometz. If a food contains even a trace of chometz, we don't eat it, we don't sell it, and we make sure not to have any of it in our possession on any of the days of Passover.

Cleaning for Passover

Take all the chometz—both food and utensils used throughout the year (and not koshered for Passover)—and store it all away in closets or rooms that you will lock or tape shut. You'll sell this chometz temporarily to a non-Jew.

Clean your entire house, purging it of all crumbs and small pieces of food. Also check for chometz in your car and office—don't overlook desks and drawers.

How to Prepare the Kitchen

Since the kitchen has been used the whole year long for chometz, it's going to need some work to prepare it for Passover use. Contact us for details.

Shopping for Passover

While shopping for Passover, we must be careful that the foods we buy are not only kosher but are also kosher-for-Passover—that is, completely chometz-free.

In addition to raw ingredients, there are many kosher-for-Passover packaged foods available. However, be careful to purchase only those packaged foods that display the insignia of a reliable supervising agency, together with "P" or "kosher for Passover."

Obviously, all leavened foods such as bread and cake made from wheat, barley, rye, oats or spelt are actual chometz and are prohibited on Passover. Examples are breakfast cereals, licorice, most candy bars, pasta, vinegar, beer and whiskey.

How to Sell the Chometz

Since we can't own chometz on Passover, we need to sell to a non-Jew, before the time indicated on the calendar, all chometz that we will not consume or destroy before Passover. This is not a simple transaction. That is why we empower a competent Rabbi to do it for us.

Search for Chometz

On the evening of April 10 we search our homes for chometz.

Burning the Chometz

On the morning of April 11, we burn the chometz that was found during the search and all other chometz that is not stored away to either be sold to the non-Jew or eaten on Shabbat morning.



NISSAN 15-16 | THE SEDER NIGHTS

The first two nights of Passover we conduct a Seder—a festive yet solemn event. At a table royally set with our best crystal and silver and the finest of kosher wines, we re-enact the Exodus from Egypt in ancient times. We also pray for the forthcoming redemption speedily in our days.

At the Seder, each person considers himself as if he was going out of Egypt. We are with our people as they descend into exile and suffer cruel oppression. We are with them when G-d sends the Ten Plagues to punish Pharaoh and his nation, with them as they leave Egypt, and with them at the crossing of the Red Sea.

Second Night of Pesach

On the second night of Pesach (April 13) we begin Sefirat

Ha'omer, the counting of the 49 days between Pesach and Shavuot.

NISSAN 22: LAST DAY OF PASSOVER

The eighth day of Passover is traditionally associated with our fervent hope for the coming of Moshiach.

The Baal Shem Tov, founder of Chassidus, instituted the custom of eating a special third meal on the last day of Passover, complete with matzah and wine, called the "Meal of Moshiach." On that day, he said, one can feel the approach of Moshiach.

Passover does not end until the night of April 20, at the time indicated on the calendar. Until approximately an hour after that time, no chometz should be bought or eaten.

THE MEZUZAH

Inside that small case nailed or glued at the entrance of a Jewish home is a miniature scroll, written with exquisite care by an expert scribe, containing the Shema Yisrael—the proclamation of a Jew's faith. The mezuzah is a covenant we have made with the Master of the Universe: We will inscribe His unity upon the doorposts of our homes, and He will protect us wherever we may be found.

It is a symbol for all that a Jew is meant to accomplish in this world—for this entire cosmos is truly His home, lacking but the signature of the Artist at the entrance to each thing.

A mezuzah should be affixed to the doorpost of every room in the home and place of business, including the basement, attic and garage. We do not place one at the entrance to a bathroom. Each mezuzah should be examined by a reliable scribe at least twice every seven years.

Before affixing a mezuzah to a doorpost, recite the following blessing:

SEFIRAT HA'OMER | COUNTING OF THE OMER

The festivals of Pesach and Shavuot are linked: Pesach marks our physical liberation (the Exodus from Egypt and the birth of the Jewish nation), and on Shavuot we received the Torah—the spiritual essence and liberation of the Jewish people. To note this link, we count every one of the forty-nine days between these two festivals. This counting, called Sefirat Ha'omer, expresses our eager anticipation of receiving the Torah.

The counting begins on the second night of Pesach, immediately after nightfall, and is continued every subsequent evening (after nightfall). Buh-rookh ah-tuh ah-doh-noi, eh-loh-hay-noo meh-lech huh-oh-luhm, ah-shehr kee-deh-shuh-noo beh-mitz-voh-suhv, veh-tzee-vuh-noo lik-boh-ah mehzoo-zuh.

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, Who has sanctified us with His commandments, and has commanded us to affix a mezuzah.

If more than one mezuzah is being affixed at one time, only one blessing is recited. When affixing a mezuzah to an entrance without a door, no blessing is recited.

The mezuzah is affixed:

A. On the right doorpost as one enters.B. In a slanted position, with the top pointed to the inside of the room.C. In the upper third of the doorpost height. (If the doorway is very tall, place it at shoulder height.)D. On the outer 3.2 inches of the width of the doorpost.

IYAR 2

Birthday of Rabbi Shmuel (1834–1882), known as the Rebbe MaHaRaSH, fourth leader of Chabad-Lubavitch.

IYAR 14 | PESACH SHENI

The Second Passover. The year after the Exodus, G-d commanded the Jewish People to celebrate Passover in the desert. However, some complained that they had become ritually impure and would not be able to purify themselves in time to offer their Passover sacrifice. G-d told Moses they would get a second chance to offer their sacrifice on Iyar 14 (a month after Nissan 14,



when the Passover sacrifice is normally brought). This applied until the cessation of sacrifices with the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 CE. Many still have a custom of celebrating the day by eating matzah.

IYAR 18 | LAG B'OMER

The 33rd day of the Omer counting is celebrated as a holiday. Two reasons: 1) Between Passover and Shavuot, one year in the early 2nd century, 24,000 disciples of Rabbi Akiva (greatest Sage of Israel in the Mishnaic period) passed away because they were not respectful enough to each other. Therefore, this period is a time of semi-mourning (no weddings, etc.). On the 33rd (LaG = 33) day of the Omer, they stopped dying. 2) An outstanding later disciple of Rabbi Akiva, Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, Mishnaic Sage and author of the Zohar, principal work of Jewish mysticism (Kabbalah), passed away. Having fulfilled his mission in this world, he asked that the anniversary be celebrated as a happy day.

Children have a custom to play with bows and arrows, and are taken on trips to parks or the countryside. There is a widespread custom to light bonfires the previous night.

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THE THREE FESTIVALS AND BIKKURIM

"Three times a year, all your males shall appear"-Deuteronomy 16:16.

Three times annually, during the festivals of Passover, Shavuot, and Sukkot, Jews were commanded to go to the Holy Temple to be "seen" by G-d. Children capable of making the journey were also brought along. One key mitzvah associated with Shavuot is bringing the Bikkurim, or first fruits.

FOOD FOR THE SOUL

Just as there are foods that are good for the body and foods that are harmful, so there are foods that nourish the inner person-the souland foods that harm it.

The kosher laws are the Torah's guide to those foods that affect the Jewish soul adversely. Any meat or fowl that is eaten must be slaughtered in a prescribed, Halachic fashion. Meat and milk

must never mix. Scavengers, predatory beasts and birds, shellfish and certain other animals are forbidden. Any processed foods must be produced under strict Rabbinical supervision.

SIVAN 6-7: SHAVUOT

Shavuot is a major festival, celebrating an event so important that the world would be an entirely different place without it. 3,337 years ago on this day, the entire Jewish nation stood at the foot of Mount Sinai, and the transmission of Torah from heaven to earth began.

The literal meaning of the word Torah is "instructions." The same Manufacturer who produced the world provides instructions on what to do with it. Every story of the Torah is a lesson in life with a myriad of applications. Nothing it contains is irrelevant or anachronistic, because the Torah is eternal wisdom, beyond space and time. In fact, our Sages say, Torah is the blueprint by which the world was designed.

Shavuot Observances

On the first night of Shavuot many communities host an all-night learnathon. The next morning, June 2, every man, woman and child attends services to hear the Ten Commandments read from a Torah scroll. It is especially important for children to be there, since they served as our guarantors the first time the Torah was given. Before the main meat meal on the first day of Shavuot, the tradition is to

eat a festive dairy meal (not hard cheese). Cheesecake is a big hit.

Some have the custom on Shavuot to decorate their synagogues and homes with flowers, fruits and greens.

King David passed away on Shavuot. So did the father of the Chassidic movement, Rabbi Yisrael Baal Shem Toy. Happy Shavuot!

TAMMUZ 3

Passing of the Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem Mendel Schneerson, in 1994. The Rebbe emphasized many times after the passing of his father-in-law, in 1950, that the anniversary of the passing of a righteous Jewish leader is an auspicious time for us to rededicate ourselves to the realization of his most cherished goals.

TAMMUZ 12-13

Birthday of Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak Schneersohn (1880–1950), sixth leader of Chabad-Lubavitch.


Release of Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak Schneersohn from Bolshevik imprisonment in Leningrad in 1927. His imprisonment followed his implacable struggle to preserve Jewish religious life throughout the Soviet Union. Aided by his faithful followers, he established a vast underground network of Torah schools, and of financial aid for construction and upkeep of mikvaos (ritual pools for marital purity), for Shabbat observers and for the purchase of religious objects. Although the initial sentence was death, international pressure brought commutation to 10 years' hard labor in the Arctic, and then to three years' exile in the Urals. After a few days in exile, he was released on Tammuz 12-13 and, soon after, forced to leave Russia. His release was considered. under the circumstances. miraculous.

TAMMUZ 17

Moses descended from Mt. Sinai, after G-d had taught him the entire Torah for 40 days. In his hands he carried the two stone tablets engraved with the Ten Commandments. But when he saw the Jewish People worshipping the Golden Calf, he smashed the tablets down in disgust.

In later generations, King Menashe set up an idol in the Temple; Apostomos (a Greek general?) burnt a Torah scroll; the daily sacrifices had to stop; and the Romans breached Jerusalem's wall (70 CE).

This day is observed as one of the six public fast days. It begins the "Three Weeks," a period of national mourning for the destruction of the two Temples, during which we celebrate no weddings and schedule no festivities.



TEFILLIN

"You shall bind them as a sign upon your hand, and they shall be for a reminder between your eyes"— Deuteronomy 6:8.

You have a brain. It is in one world. Your heart is in another. And your hands often end up involved in something completely foreign to both of them. Three diverse machines.

So you put on tefillin. First thing in the day, you connect your head, your heart and your hand with these leather straps—all to work as one, with one intent: a dedicated service of the Almighty. And then, when you go out to meet the world, all your actions

find harmony in a single coordinated purpose.

Tefillin are a pair of black leather boxes containing Hebrew parchment scrolls. A set includes two tefillin—one for the head and one for the arm. Each consists of three main components: the scrolls, the box and the strap. The scrolls are inserted into boxes made of leather that have been painted black.

One box is strapped on your head, and the other onto your arm next to your heart. It's done once a day—preferably during the morning prayers. If that is not practical, say at least the passage called the Shema. It's done by Jewish males, age 13 and up, every day except Shabbat and major Jewish holidays.

THE CHUPPAH

A traditional Jewish wedding is rich with biblical, historical, and mystical significance, Threads carried from one generation to the next, forming a chain of Jewish continuity which goes back more than 3,800 years, symbolizing the union between G-d and the Jewish people. The wedding day is likened to a personal Yom Kippur, emphasizing its spiritual importance.

The ceremony takes place under a chuppah, a decorated canopy open on all sides, symbolizing the couple's commitment to establish a home which will always be open to guests, as was the tent of Abraham and Sarah.

Traditionally, it is held outdoors under the sky, recalling G-d's promise to Abraham of countless descendants. The chuppah signifies a household dedicated to spiritual and heavenly ideals, with the Divine Presence and the spirits of deceased ancestors gracing the event.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, the groom breaks a glass beneath his foot. This act serves as a poignant reminder of the destruction of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, ensuring that even in moments of greatest joy, the couple remembers the enduring sorrow of their people. This tradition underscores the balance between joy and remembrance in Jewish life, infusing the celebration with a deeper spiritual awareness.

AV 9: TISHA B'AV

Saddest day in the Jewish calendar. Commemorated as a 25-hour fast, beginning at sunset of the previous evening.

Anniversary of the Divine decree that the Jewish People remain in the desert for 40 years, until that generation died out, after they cried over the 10 spies' false report about the Land of Israel.

Anniversary of the destruction (by the Babylonians under Nebuchadnezzar) of the First Temple (422 BCE), and (by the Romans under Titus) of the Second Temple (70 CE).

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Capture by Romans of Beitar, last Jewish fortress to hold out in the Bar Kochba rebellion, with terrible loss of life (c. 135 CE). Jerusalem was ploughed up and turned into a non-Jewish city, Aelia Capitolina (c. 135 CE).

In 1492, Av 9 was the last day by which all Jews who would not be baptized had to leave Spain. Over 300,000 chose to leave, suffering terrible privations till they found stable new places of abode. Many never made it, victims of pirates, unscrupulous ship captains, robbers and starvation. Of those who succumbed and converted in order to remain in Spain, many secretly retained their Jewish identity for generations. They were known as Marranos. But many were caught by the Inquisition's watchful eye and burnt at the stake.

World War I, too, began on Av 9. It uprooted large Jewish populations and threw most Jewish communities into chaos. It brought in its wake the Russian Revolution, which systematically crushed Judaism; the Cossack massacres of Jews throughout the Ukraine (1918–1921); and the conditions which gave rise to Nazism and the Holocaust.

AV 15

Anniversary of several happy events: the end of the 40-year decree that the Jewish People remain in the desert; the reconciliation of the tribe of Benjamin with the other tribes of Israel; the removal of the guards stationed by Jeroboam ben Nebat to prevent pilgrimages of the Ten Tribes of Israel to the Temple in Jerusalem; and the grant of Roman permission to bury the dead of Beitar, after 14 years. "There were no greater holidays for the Jewish People than Av 15 and Yom Kippur."

AV 20

Rabbi Levi Yitzchak Schneerson, renowned scholar and Kabbalist, and father of the Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem Schneerson, passed away (1944).

The Holy Temple

The place where King Solomon built the altar of the Holy Temple was the same place where Abraham built an altar and bound his son Isaac, where Noah built an altar upon his departure from the ark, where Cain and Abel brought their offerings, and where Adam brought his sacrifice after he was created. There too, Adam's creation took place.

In the Temple's Holy of Holies, atop the Ark of the Covenant, were the winged cherubim, two angelic figures of gold. Inside the Ark were placed the original Tablets upon which the Ten Commandments are inscribed.

Among the miracles associated with the Temple was the fact that, although hundreds of thousands of pilgrims would visit Jerusalem for the Festivals, no one ever lacked a place to stay.

The Menorah, the Temple's seven-branched candelabra, was fashioned with many intricate decorations and designs from a single block of gold. Moses had difficulty understanding and explaining how it should be made. Therefore, the Al-mighty told him to throw the gold ingot into the fire and the Menorah emerged by itself, fully formed.

Though the Temple is destroyed, an outer wall has remained intact throughout the centuries the Western Wall. All over the world, Jews pray three times daily toward the site of the Temple, the gate through which all our prayers are heard and answered. As our Sages tell us, the Divine Presence never departs from the Western Wall.

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AV 30: ROSH CHODESH ELUL

First day of Rosh Chodesh Elul. Moses ascended Mt. Sinai, for the third time, with the tablets he had carved. The next 40 days, till Yom Kippur, were days of Divine acceptance and favor, during which G-d's mercy was aroused to totally forgive His people for the sin of the Golden Calf. We reenact this year by year, devoting time during the month of Elul (and the Ten Days of Teshuvah till Yom Kippur) to review our ways, seeking to correct whatever needs correcting in thought, speech, and deed.

ELUL 18

Birthday of Rabbi Yisrael Baal Shem Tov (1698–1760), founder of Chassidism, renowned for his love of every Jew. Birthday of Rabbi Shneur Zalman of Liadi (1745–1812), known as the Alter Rebbe, founder of the Chabad-Lubavitch intellectual branch of Chassidism, author of Tanya and Shulchan Aruch HaRav.

TISHREI 1-2: ROSH HASHANAH

Rosh Hashanah ("Head of the Year"), the Jewish New Year, is celebrated as a two-day holiday. On these days the Heavenly Court decides all that is to happen to all beings during the coming year.

It is customary on Rosh Hashanah to eat foods symbolizing sweetness, blessings and abundance. We dip the challah in honey; and afterwards, on the first night of the holiday, Sept. 22, we eat a piece of apple dipped in honey. After the appropriate blessing on the apple, we add: "May it be Your will to renew for us a good and sweet year." Other customs include eating the head of a fish, pomegranates and carrots.

THE SHOFAR

On both days of Rosh Hashanah, Tuesday, Sept. 23, and Wednesday, Sept. 24, we hear during the daytime at least the first thirty of the prescribed blasts of the Shofar (ram's horn).

The Shofar, the oldest and most soulful of wind instruments, has many meanings. Among them: It proclaims the coronation of G-d as King of the Universe. It awakens us to repent and return to G-d. It reminds us of the Shofar heard at Mount Sinai, when we accepted G-d's commandments for all time.

TASHLICH

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Tuesday, Sept. 23, following the afternoon prayer, we visit a body of water or pond containing live fish and recite the Tashlich prayers, in which we cast away our sins. As fish depend upon water, so do we depend upon G-d's providence. Also, a fish's eyes never close, symbolizing G-d's unceasing watchfulness over us.



SHABBAT CANDLES

Darkness is setting upon the world; the workweek is coming to a close. A week of activity, a week of growth, a tiring week. But as the sun goes down, a new day is being ushered in: the day for which we toiled the entire week, a day of rest and tranquility, the holy Shabbat.

Greeting the Shabbat (and also Jewish holidays) are girls and women across the globe. Shortly before sunset they light candles, which usher in peace and blessing to their homes and to the world.

The Torah enjoins us to "honor the Shabbat and call it a delight." Now, one element of this "delight" is to have candles lit. In addition to creating a bright and cheery ambiance, the candles ensure that we don't spend the evening stumbling around in the dark. The Torah clearly tells us that we may not kindle fire on Shabbat. So the key is to light the delight-giving candles before the onset of the day.

The mystics explain that Shabbat is the day that brings illumination to our world, which so often seems to be dark and negative. Furthermore, candles are a metaphor for Torah and for the human soul.

The Shabbat candles represent the light we introduce into the world through studying Torah and observing its precepts. And they also represent the additional soul that our sages say we are given on Shabbat.
